We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2020-2021 educational progress for Mason Middle School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. For the 2021-22 school year, schools were identified based on previous years' performance using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that had at least one underperforming student subgroup in 2021-22. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that had a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2021-22. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance was in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or had a graduation rate at or below 67% in 2021-22. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given. Mason Middle School was not given a label.

Mason Middle School houses students in grades 6-8. Three district elementary buildings matriculate a number of fifth grade sections into our building each year. All students attending our school either reside within the Mason Public Schools district boundaries, or they attend through the Schools of Choice program if they are non-Mason residents, including any special needs students in various categories.

The middle school staff developed our current 3-5 year school improvement plan and incorporated the strategies and action steps associated with five goals. Our faculty and stakeholders are currently engaged in school improvement initiatives to address learning loss during the COVID-19 learning time and working with students and families to address mental health issues within our student body. The current school improvement process and plan is ongoing, specific to goals in Reading, Science, Mathematics, Social Studies, Behavior (PBIS), Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) and SEL (Social Emotional Learning), and they are aligned to curriculum council and district goals.

A copy of our K-12 core curriculum is on file in our district's central office and our district has adopted the Common Core State Standards for English Language Arts and Mathematics. Additionally, science and social studies curriculum is aligned with Michigan Science Standards and Michigan Social Studies Standards.

Our total aggregate M-Step/PSAT Test scores for each subject area in 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 are described are described in Table 1.
