PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE: MASON PUBLIC SCHOOLS 2025 BOND

As outlined in the 2023-2028 Strategic Plan, Mason Public Schools (MPS) is actively exploring a Bond offering for voters in November 2025. As our school community grows and changes, it is important that we look ahead in order to support long-term growth, enhance learning environments and address facility needs.

A dedicated Bond Steering Committee, made up of Mason community members, educators, administrators and parents began meeting regularly in February to review survey data, examine district needs and collect community feedback. This committee is working to shape the final bond proposal, ensuring it reflects the community's priorities as well as the needs of the district.

To help determine the bond proposal's scope and priorities, Mason residents shared input through a District Needs Survey this winter. Residents submitted more than 1,000 responses providing valuable feedback as we assess the district's needs, community support and our shared vision for the future of Mason Public Schools. Mason residents are invited to a Community Forum on May 12 at Mason City Hall at 6 PM to hear about the bond planning process, learn more about the proposed Bond and provide feedback directly to district leaders.

SAFE DRIVING COMES TO MASON MIDDLE SCHOOL

Mason High School students brought their *Drive Safe, Someone Loves You.* campaign to Mason Middle School to share information and influence younger students to be safe passengers and safe drivers.

Students had the opportunity to try out a distracted driving simulator, impaired driving goggles, sign a pledge to ride and drive safely, and learn more about safe driving.

The Mason Safe Driving campaign was launched in 2023 and educates students about safe driving through peer-to-peer education, hands-on demonstrations, and impactful presentations and speakers.



HEALTH TEAM HELPS STAFF INCREASE PREPAREDNESS FOR INJURY

With an ongoing focus on prioritizing safety training and education, Mason Public Schools (MPS) continues to expand Stop the Bleed training by offering hands-on instruction for teachers and staff. The MPS Health Team, with support from the MPS Comprehensive School Safety Team and district administrators, have supported the training in order to benefit the whole Bulldog community.

This year, staff members completed either initial or refresher training in the protocol which prepares them to respond to a variety of bleeding-related injuries. These range from minor incidents, like a bloody nose in the classroom, to more serious accidents and situations.

"Having Stop the Bleed kits in buildings and training staff to use them helps keep our schools safer," said District Nurse

Emily Epling. "When we received the kits and rolled out the program in 2022, we trained the building Crisis Teams to use them. Now, we're working to train all staff and provide refresher courses so staff feel comfortable using the equipment."

Stop the Bleed kits align with the American College of Surgeons' national initiative to train bystanders in bleeding control. Initial funding for the kits came from a grant secured by the Charlotte Police Department and the Tri-County Active Violence Incident (AVI) team, as part of Congresswoman Elisa Slotkin's Community Funding Project. This funding provided enough kits for every classroom in Eaton, Ingham, and Clinton counties.


In 2022, MPS partnered with Eaton Rapids Medical Center and the District 1 Regional Medical Response Coalition to place Stop the Bleed kits in each school building. MPS is grateful for the regional support and partnerships that make this program possible and keep our schools safe!

Well, if you ask the researchers, reading scores nationally have plummeted – not surprising with all the gadgets and online platforms available!

But I witnessed reading in action in the Mason Middle School library. One Monday morning, I arrived unannounced at the library to find Carla Richards' sixth grade class circled up on the rug with Walter, the visiting therapy dog whose specialty is listening to students read.

All were attentively listening to their teacher's explanation of what book she was currently reading and the character in the book she identified with and why. After all, modeling is the most powerful tool teachers possess!



Quickly, she shifted to asking her students to do the same regarding a character in a book they were reading. If they couldn't identify with any characters, she asked that they give reasons why not. Giving purpose to silent reading is essential, and asking for accountability establishes expectations that all students need to be actually reading!

The "frosting" to this Monday morning experience was giving these sixth graders the option of reading with Walter. While you might be rolling your eyes on this one, reading to a therapy dog has been proven to offer several benefits including helping students improve their reading skills, building confidence, developing a positive association with reading, creating a relaxed atmosphere where students can practice reading to a non-judgmental listener without fear of criticism and enhancing motivation.

These things can also all lead to increased levels of serotonin and dopamine chemicals in the body which are associated with positive feelings!

At the conclusion of this amazing library session, students circled up on the rug, once again, to talk about their characters. Walter wagged his tail as if to say, "Great job, kids!" Who would have thought Walter would be praising middle schoolers on a Monday morning in the library?
