DISTRICT CREATES NEW ENRICHMENT AND GIFTED AND TALENT PROGRAMS

Beginning in late January, students at all grade levels will have the opportunity to participate in new STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and math) enrichment and Gifted and Talented (GT) offerings, which will occur after school.

Through a first-of-its-kind pilot partnership with Lansing Community College (LCC), Mason students in grades 2-12 can participate in after school LCC Youth Enrichment Classes at the Harvey Education Center, Mason Middle School and Mason High School. Thanks to a generous \$8,000 grant from the Mason Public Schools Foundation (MPSF), the District is offering new after school GT programming, taught by Mason teachers, in English Language Arts and math starting winter 2020. Courses will be available for students in grades 2-3, 4-5 and 6-8. The GT courses will expose qualified students to curriculum and instruction that's several years advanced for their grade level while building on what's taught during the school day. Qualified students will be invited to participate based on academic aptitude, teacher nomination and parent/guardian and student nomination. There is no cost for these after school courses. MIDDLE SCHOOL LAUNCHES POSITIVE OFFICE REFERRAL PROGRAM

This fall, Mason Middle School rolled out a new program to recognize students who continue to do the right things but maybe don't get recognized as often as they should.

Mason Middle School expects students to be respectful, responsible and ready to learn each and every day. Students that are being recognized with Positive Office Referrals are demonstrating these qualities.

In the first trimester, 54 Positive Office Referrals were processed. The goal for second trimester is to double this number. The Positive Office Referral program has been well received by our students and parents. After a Positive Office Referral is processed, Mr. Berryhill or Mr. Kueffner call home and talk to parents and guardians about their students. The team feels this recognition is very important to reinforce a positive school culture at Mason Middle School.

DISTRICT PRIORITIZES LITERACY BY HIRING FULL-TIME LIBRARIANS

As students returned this fall, they were welcomed back with additional supports that have not existed in many years. Three full-time, certified librarians, which have been continually cut from district budgets throughout the State, are now a part of Mason Public Schools' staff to support student literacy. These new librarians join three full-time literacy coaches to form a unified team of individuals available to students and staff to assist with data, curriculum and instruction.

The primary focus of these librarians is to support the K-5 literacy curriculum. Goals include, promoting a love of reading for all students, providing background knowledge associated with reading selections in the existing Wonders curriculum and engaging in pre-teaching and application of the essential standards with an eye on improving student achievement. A priority of our Strategic Plan is to integrate literacy skills across all subject matters. By investing in these types of supports throughout all district buildings, it is evident that Mason's commitment to student success is strong.

"Literacy is certainly a hot button issue right now. Mason has been committed to improving literacy at all grade levels and subject areas for many years," said Ronald Drzewicki, Ed.S., Superintendent of Mason Public Schools.



"We have made the commitment to provide internal supports to teachers and students to improve reading skills. By providing these resources to dig into the data and trends of student learning, we have seen strong growth and success for students."

It also transforms traditional school environments into interactive spaces using a vast catalog of purposeful activities and world-class audiovisual equipments," according to the company.
